SUBJECT AREA AND COURSE NUMBER: CJS G211

COURSE TITLE: Criminal Law

COURSE CATALOG DESCRIPTION: The examination and study of criminal statutes with emphasis on theory and philosophy of law, its relationship to law and society along with its development, application and enforcement.

SECTION II

A. SCOPE: This course provides instruction of the most common crimes prosecuted in American courts, including homicide, sexual assault, theft, and crimes against public order and morals. Students will obtain an understanding of the nature, origins, purposes and interpretations of criminal law, the general principles of criminal liability, complicity and vicarious liability, as well as the defenses to liability such as insanity and self-defense. Current cases in the criminal justice court system will be examined.
