## COURSE OUTLINE ESL 185

## SECTION I

SUBJECT AREA AND COURSE NUMBER: ESL 185

COURSE TITLE: Modes of Communication

Course Catalog Description: A five-week seminar that introduces basic North American communications media. Discussion and activities build student competence with several media, particularly with those needed for success in academic work. Corequisite: ESL 153A and ESL 157A. Prerequisite: ESL placement examination or successful completion of ESL 143 and ESL 147A.

LECTURE HOURS PER WEEK: 3 CREDIT HOURS:

LAB HOURS PER WEEK: 0

PREREQUISITES: Specified score in ESL Placement Test or successful completion of ESL Level IV.

This course is designed to be taken before or concurrently with ESL 157A & 153A.

## SECTION II

A. SCOPE: ESL 185 orients students to and offers practice in the techniques and technology fundamental to academic workplace communications.

- B. REQUIRED WORK: Students will complete assignments within each workshop and will be given follow-up assignments using each mode of communication for work in their ESL 153A and 157A classes.
- C. ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION: Since most work is done during class sessions, students who are absent, tardy, or inconsistent in completing assignments will fall behind. Students are responsible for consulting with the instructor about completing any missed work. Students with more than two absences may be asked to withdraw. Students may be asked to confer with the teacher during arranged conference times.
- D. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION: Methods will vary according to the workshop, and may include lecture, discussions, small group and pair work, computer assisted instruction, audio/video units, guest presentations, or field trips.
